

Announcement of a Humanities and Social Sciences Course

Introduction to Indian Knowledge Systems

at Indian Institute of Technology Gandhinagar, January-April 2017

Indian Institute of Technology Gandhinagar's Humanities and Social Sciences discipline is offering a new edition of its elective course on **Introduction to Indian Knowledge Systems** (IKS), from January to April 2017. This course is path-breaking in the following respects:

- ➤ It explores India's intellectual, literary, artistic, scientific and technological knowledge traditions, offering an insider's perspective on Indian civilization.
- ➤ It is taught collectively by several eminent scholars from various parts of India, besides a few IIT Gandhinagar faculty members.
- > It provides enough time for teacher-student interaction.
- ➤ It is open to participation of students from other institutions in Ahmedabad-Gandhinagar (upon registration).
- > Its sessions are video-recorded and will be shared on the Internet.

The theme of this second edition of the course will be: **How did ancient Indian society perceive and depict itself?** Modern scholarship generally approaches ancient Indian society on the basis of contemporary theories; this course will attempt to look at it on its own terms, drawing data from a wide range of sources, including archaeology, epigraphy, literature, folk tales, travellers' accounts....

The course is open to anyone seriously interested in understanding and studying Indian knowledge systems. Anyone can audit it for free after registering with the course coordinators (see below).
